In 1884, Thomas Davis, Mattie's husband, remarried, and they had three additional children. It is highly probably that the Palmers were taking care of the two baby boys in at the time of this letter. Additionally, son Herbert Palmer was killed in a logging accident.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Patsy (Palmer) Bruce, JH's sister. She first married Peyton Graves, and had one or two sons, Hiram P Graves (b 1845, d 1862 in a prison camp), and perhaps William B Graves (he may be a cousin. The jury is still out on that one). Peyton was one of Catherine Nowlin [Graves] Palmer's brothers. Catherine was, of course, John Henry Palmer's wife. Secondly, Patsy married her first cousin, Horatio Gates Bruce, son of Horatio Bruce, who was brother to Patsy's grandmother, Rebecca (Bruce) Palmer. They lived in Texas, where Horatio was big in politics. They had five children, only one of whom I've been able to track children for. Horatio died 11 Jan 1882, in Austin, Texas. There was a town, Bruce, Texas, named after Horatio.




<sup>i</sup> Hills Ferry is south of Modesto, as shown on this map:
